As she walked up the piano side aisle to find a seat, she was approached by a woman. Deb said the lady was extremely friendly and not only did she spend time with her before the service, she also talked with her during greeting time in the service and again after the service was over!

There are a couple of interesting points about Deb's encounter with this individual. First, the person was not a part of any official "Greeters Ministry" at Riverton, she was acting as an individual who desired to show and be the welcoming love of Jesus to a stranger in the house. Secondly, she was the <u>only</u> person who reached out to Deb that morning...and thank God she did! Two and a half years later, Deb and I are still talking about what a difference one single person made at her first Riverton service.

Every time we gather for worship on Sunday morning, **all** of us have the opportunity and privilege to be the welcoming love of Jesus to our guests, especially to those who have chosen to worship with us for the very first time. Our Spiritual Story Begins in the Old Testament

For the past few months in Sunday school we have been studying the Old Testament (OT). The study is *An Overview of the Bible* but has gone into a bit more depth than is typical with an overview. It is difficult to not want to get into the rich detail of the culture and lives of the OT characters. We are just getting ready to enter into the world the Israelites found when they escaped Egypt loaded down with gifts from their Egyptian neighbors but soon to be pursued by Egyptian soldiers.

I've read the OT before but have enjoyed this study for several reasons. As a lover of history, the historical aspect of the OT has always appealed to me, but this time through I'm looking at it from the perspective of the Christian's (my) spiritual story; more on that later. Secondly, the current sermon series in Romans stands out in relief against the backdrop of a chosen people, having just escaped Egypt, surrounded by pagan cultures, fighting for survival and graciously being given the gift of the law from God. In the current Sunday Romans sermon series we now see this law being debated by the Jews and Gentiles in Rome. Third, the culture today, both secular and Christian, questions the God of the OT and would like to separate the God of the first 39 books from the God of the last 27. I disagree with that claim but want to do more than just deny it. I want to explain why I disagree.

We often tend to read the OT in small pieces or stories told here and there. Perhaps this starts in Sunday school when young but in any case we don't often begin in Genesis and work our way to the end. We dwell on individual's stories or perhaps the practicality of the Proverbs or Poetry of the Psalms. While there is nothing wrong with this, it tends to keep us down in what authors Gordon Fee and Douglas Stuart call the first level of narrative. We know the stories of Joseph, Moses, or David very well but not how they fit into the second and third levels of narrative which are particularly important in the OT. The second level of narrative focuses on the first covenant and new covenant story of redemption. We find this played out beginning with Abraham through to Jesus death and resurrection. The third level of narrative is God's universal plan starting with creation. God made man in His image, and the enemy came in and persuaded man to bear the enemy's image. The rest of the story is God's plan to win His people back, redeem them, and set up a new heaven and new earth. As the authors put it, it's really God's story with us written into it. We can see how God uses the people he loves, at the first level of the story, to bring about His plan. We can relate to their triumphs and failures, but always keep in mind the story is about God and His plan to redeem His people.

As we have been listening to Pastor Marc teach Romans on Sundays, reading about the Mosaic Law has taken on a different meaning than in prior readings. The Israelites would have come out of Egypt after having been in slavery to one of the greatest nations in the world at that time, approximately 1440 BC. They were used to the lifestyle of the Egyptians, the customs and gods of the Egyptians, they did not have their own warriors, and were about to come into contact with cultures who were pagan and more than practiced an evil that God was going to punish. They needed to stay separate from those around them.

God gave them a set of laws that while they were comprehensive in some aspects with a list of Do's and Don'ts, they also contained examples of how to handle situations that might arise. They were meant to be guidelines rather than list every possible eventuality. The spirit of the law was meant to be kept. I did not notice until recently that the greatest two commandments are recorded in Deuteronomy 30:6,

⁶ "Moreover the LORD your God will circumcise your heart and the heart of your descendants, to love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul, so that you may live." And Leviticus 19:18, ¹⁸ You shall not take vengeance, nor bear any grudge against the sons of your people, but you shall love your neighbor as yourself; I am the LORD." The spirit of the law was necessary. Even if you could keep all of the law, it would be human success through works and not the Spirit. See Romans 8:1-11.

Paul writing to the church in Rome tells the Jews that they do not have a corner on righteousness through the Law. Even when the Law was in effect they chose not to follow it in spirit and turned to other gods. Likewise the Gentiles need to walk in the Spirt. Paul reminds them in Abraham, who was a Gentile when the promise of redemption was made to him, Romans 4:11.

Finally, the God of the OT is the same God we see in the New Testament sending His Son to die for our sins, fulfilling his promise to Abraham, and as the story goes, redeeming His people. If you read through the OT, you will see over and over how patiently God deals with His people. Over and over He reminded them of His promise and their commitment to follow Him, sending prophet after prophet to remind them to turn back to Him, always holding out mercy when they repented. Rather than being a vengeful God, we see a god who kept His promise of redemption, worked with the faults of His people, punished them not when they failed in their human ability to keep the Law but when they turned their back on Him to serve other gods.

It is well worth taking the time to read the Old Testament starting in Genesis and working your way through book by book. Keep in mind that you are reading your spiritual story of God's plan of redemption. Every individual story told supports God's plan. Saint Augustine said "The New Testament lies hidden in the Old, and the Old Testament is unveiled in the New". I have found that listening to the sermon series on Romans while studying the OT has really been helpful. I recommend reading the OT with the aid of a good commentary or Bible handbook. Good tools bring to life passages and cultures that are outdated and foreign to 21st century ears. Below are some of my recommendations. *An Overview of the Bible* Sunday school class meets every Sunday, at 8:45 in room 125. All are welcome.

Suggestions for Study

How to Read the Bible for All Its Worth, Gordon Fee & Douglas Stuart

This book gives an overview of the various genres of the Bible such as Hebrew narrative (40% of the Old Testament) prophecy, (individual oracles that usually point back to historical events), parables, and poetry. The authors also look at the various translations available and how they differ.

How to Read the Bible Book by Book: A Guided Tour, Gordon Fee and Douglas Stuart

The authors go into each book of the Bible giving cultural context, key themes, and writing style. For example, did you know Paul wrote Romans in a popular form of ancient rhetoric known as diatribe? This was a form of argumentation where the teacher tried to persuade the students the truth of a particular philosophy in the form of questions and answers often with an imagined debate partner. Look for Paul to say "By No Means!" in the text. This is part of that dialogue. No wonder Romans is hard to understand!

Tyndale Old Testament Commentaries

Purchased a book at a time, various authors write each commentary and walk you through a verse by verse study with comments. Note that you do not have to agree with every piece of commentary. The authors themselves are often scholars who contribute to the footnotes you see in your Bibles.


